WHAT EXACTLY IS PAPERLESS BILLING?

Paperless billing is a service that allows Wake Electric members to receive their billing information online rather than in a printed, paper format. Paperless billing subscribers opt not to receive a paper bill in the mail and instead receive an e-mail notification each month directing them to view and pay their bill online at Wake Electric's E-bill website.

And when you choose our Handi-Pay bank draft option, you don't have to worry about paying your bill online—you can choose an automatic draft date that works best for you. This means no more paperwork or keeping up with due dates each month.

GOING GREEN

By helping Wake Electric cut down on the use of paper bills, you also help conserve natural resources and reduce our carbon footprint.

If you sign up for Handi-pay bank draft, E-bill, and paperless billing between March 1 and July 16, you will automatically be entered into a drawing for a \$50 bill credit. The drawing will be held July 2010. Winners will be notified in July and announced online and in the *Electri-Connection* section of the *Carolina Country* in September.

2010 Rural Electric Youth Tour Winners Chosen

High-school juniors Clay Long and Sallie Pete Thompson, both of Wake Forest, have been selected by Wake Electric to attend the 2010 Rural Electric Youth Tour in Washington D.C. this June. Long, 17, is a student at Wake Forest-Rolesville High. Thompson, 17, attends Raleigh Charter High School. The two will join nearly 1,500 students from across the United States for a one-week all expenses paid trip to the nation's capital. Both students will also receive a \$1,000 scholarship in their high school senior year upon enrollment in a college or university.

Over the course of the week, Long and Thompson, traveling with delegations from North Carolina, will visit historic sites and spend time with congressional leaders. Students will create podcasts and digital photo projects as they learn about electric cooperatives and discuss issues in energy and climate change legislation that face their communities and the nation.

"Energy is a hot topic right now," said Angela Perez, Public Relations and Communications Specialist for Wake Electric. "Students are hearing about renewable and sustainable energy in the news every day. Clay and Sallie are not only high-achieving students, but they also both demonstrated an in-depth and thorough understanding of issues surrounding renewable energy that are impacting the electric utility industry."

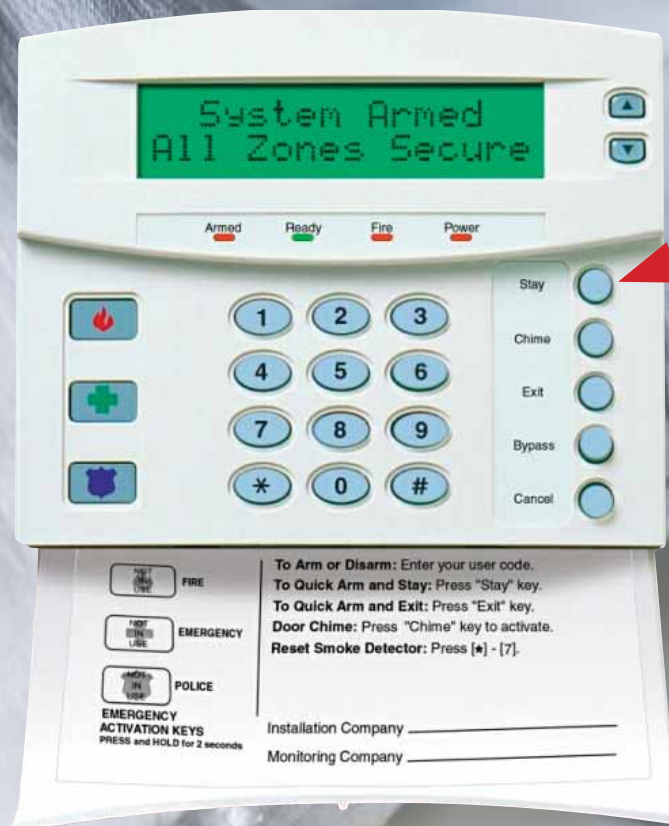
